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Aunt Ruby's Bed and Breakfast: Over A Century of Hospitality

onveniently located in Lake Charles' historic district, which is on the National Register of Historic Places, Aunt Ruby's Bed and Breakfast has been welcoming quests since 1911.

The lovely, century-old bed and breakfast boasts the claim of being the city's first boarding house, says owner and host Daniel Schaad. An experienced restaurateur — he also owns and manages the nearby PJ's Street Café — Schaad enjoys making gourmet breakfasts for his guests.

Popular with business travelers as well as tourists, Aunt Ruby's offers five luxurious rooms individually decorated with charming furnishings that capture the history and elegance of the area.

Exceptional attention to detail adds to the bed and breakfast's welcoming ambiance. At the time of its construction, houses avoided building closets because they were considered rooms and were therefore taxable. Antique wardrobes and bureaus amply make up for the lack of traditional closet space in the rooms.

Easily reached from Interstate 10 and just four blocks from the pleasant Lake Front boardwalk, Aunt Ruby's Bed and Breakfast prides itself on creating a place regular guests call their home away from home, a place where they can kick back, relax and enjoy a good, old-fashioned lemonade on the veranda and watch the world go by.



W.H. Stark House

The W.H. Stark House: A Victorian Treasure

isted on the National Register of Historic Places and designated as a Recorded Texas Historic Landmark, the W.H. Stark House is a 14,000 square foot Victorian landmark in downtown Orange that has been restored to its original splendor.

The house and its adjacent carriage house depict family life in the early 1900s and provide fascinating insight to Texas' social history. Built in 1894 in the Queen Anne architectural style by William and Miriam Stark, the house features a distinctive turret, stained glass windows and ornate woodwork in cypress and long leaf yellow pine.

The three-story structure stands much as it did at the turn of the 20th century. Its 15 rooms hold original family furnishings, personal effects, 18th- and 19th-century decorative arts, antique rugs, original textiles and silver. There is also an impressive collection of American Brilliant Period cut glass, pressed and pattern glass, and porcelains.

Prominent philanthropists, the Starks lived there until their deaths in 1936, after which the house was closed. Remarkably, it remained vacant until 1971, when a 10-year restoration process began.

In 1981, it opened to the public for guided tours as a historic house

museum. Each year it hosts a special holiday open house in which the home is resplendent with decorations, music and delicacies.

The W.H. Stark House operates as a program of the Nelda C. and H.J. Lutcher Stark Foundation, established in 1961 by H.J. Lutcher Stark, the Stark's only surviving child, and his wife Nelda.

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Kirby-Hill House

Kirby-Hill Bed & Breakfast: A Grand Old Home With A Little Mystery

uilt in 1902, the Kirby-Hill House in Kountze blends history, tours and mystery to create a rare experience.

James L. Kirby, the older brother and business partner of the more famous John Henry Kirby, built this architectural beauty that captures the elegance of the era. The Kirby family established a lumber empire that dominated the economy of the Kountze region for almost 100 years.

The Kirby-Hill House Educational Foundation was established in 1992 and raised the money to buy the property because it recognized the need to preserve this part of the town's history. The elegant and beautifully restored house features a wrap-around veranda with 48 columns, four fireplaces and eight rooms, all of which open onto the veranda. Architectural highlights include curved walls and an oval grand staircase. Guests staying at the historic bed and breakfast take a step back in time. Much of the antique furniture and décor are original to the house.

Docent-led tours showcase family pictures, papers and artifacts that date back to 1832. Each of the three quest rooms bears a name and is designed to a specific period. Lucy's suite upstairs is set in the 1940s; Stone's room in the period of the early 1800s; and Auntie's

Big Room is designed circa 1962.

And what is a bed and breakfast without a little mystery? As part of its ongoing fundraising and restoration effort, the foundation hosts Murder

Mystery Dinner Theaters. Amidst an elegant formal dinner set with linen, china, silver and lace, the play is performed room by room so all can enjoy the performance.



McFaddin-Ward House Museum: A Celebration of Heritage

ompleted in 1906, the striking McFaddin-Ward House Museum is a distinctive blend of history and heritage that educates guests about the lifestyle of the prominent family that lived in the house for 75 years.

Made wealthy by agribusiness, real estate and oil, WPH and Ida Caldwell McFaddin moved into their Beaux-Arts Colonial style home in 1907, and raised three children, Mamie, Perry Jr., and Caldwell. The 12,800 square-foot home was a glittering backdrop for parties and entertaining throughout the early 20th century. In 1919, Mamie married Carroll Ward in the parlor, and the couple moved in with her parents. They spent their entire married life there.

In 1978, Mamie established the Mamie McFaddin Ward Heritage



Foundation to preserve the house and its contents as an educational and cultural resource. Today, the museum features volunteer docent-led tours of the home's three floors, year-round events and beautiful gardens. The holiday season is particularly spectacular, with the entire home decorated, inside and out. Volunteerism is an essential component of all these efforts, with opportunities for people of all ages to join in celebrating a part of Beaumont's rich cultural heritage.

The museum is unique in that its entire collection actually belonged to the families as opposed to being items acquired to represent what the families would have owned. Education is at the heart of the museum. The family documented everything and these diaries are used to tell the McFaddin story, create a wonderful historical context for visitors, and help bring history to life.

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Pompeiian Villa

Pompeiian Villa:


ort Arthur boasts a little bit of ancient Italy among its historic buildings: the Pompeiian Villa, an authentic replica of a 79 A.D. home in Pompeii, built by Isaac Ellwood (known as the "Barbed Wire King") in 1900.

The pink stucco villa went through several owners over the years. Ellwood lived in the home for only a year before selling it to a business colleague, James Hopkins, president of the Diamond Match Company in St. Louis, Mo.

He, in turn, rented the house to James Guffey, who built the first oil refinery in Port Arthur. By 1903, the villa had been traded to George Craig in exchange for \$10,000 worth of Texaco stock. The Craig family lived in the villa until 1946, keeping it true to its original design.

By 1965, the Pompeiian Villa had been vacant for five years and was in danger of being torn down. The Port Arthur Historical Society stepped in and bought it for \$25,000. After years of meticulous restoration, the villa was opened as a public museum in the early 1970s. It was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1973.

Docent-guided tours showcase the home-turned-museum in which each room is designed with a different theme. The museum periodically features special exhibits such as the Hundreds of Santas collection. Numerous pieces of furniture, art and other historic items have been donated over the years, enabling the historical society to showcase the rich history of the Port Arthur region.



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


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What the GOLFER Wants for Christmas!

scar Blessing first came to this area as a technical sergeant during World War II. Blessing was initially sent to protect the Gulf Coast from invasion after the bombing of Pearl Harbor. He was a member of the U.S. Army's 149th Infantry 38th Division, also known as the "Avengers of Bataan."

His unit was responsible for liberating American captives that survived the Bataan Death March. In addition to their fighting in the Philippines, the unit also had a landing in New Guinea. Blessing is quick to tell you how lucky he was to make it through the war with no physical wounds.

During his time in the Army, he continued to play baseball, which he had played before the war in his native Kentucky. He played service ball against brothers Joe and Dom DiMaggio. Blessing has a tremendous respect for Joe DiMaggio.

"Joe was just one of the guys," said Blessing. He adds that DiMaggio was quick to enjoy a beer with the other ball players.

Blessing returned to Kentucky after the war. He worked for a railroad company, but strikes kept him from making a steady living. He returned to Texas and found work at what is now known as Exxon-Mobil. When he was stationed in this area early in the war, Blessing met his future wife. They have four children: one son, Dennis, and three daughters, Lee, Connie and Jan. The

girls live in Southeast Texas and Dennis is associate dean of the University of Texas Health Science Center San Antonio.

After Blessing retired from Exxon-Mobil, he continued working in other capacities. He worked security at Brystar Contracting and bar-backed David's Upstairs and MacKenzie's Pub.

To many of us Blessing is a hero in his deeds and actions. He is a humble man — well-known and well-respected. Most people known him as simply "Oscar." When you talk to someone about Oscar, they immediately know who you are talking about.


When you ask Blessing how he is doing, his reply will be, "still kicking, just not high."




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Julie Rogers "GIFT OF LIFE"

ighteen years ago, when
Beaumont attorney and
philanthropist Regina Rogers
celebrated her mother's recovery
from breast cancer by providing
free mammograms for women who
couldn't afford them, she started a
chain reaction of generosity and love
that would grow into a powerful force
to save lives throughout Southeast
Texas. Deeply moved by the great
need for women to receive cancer
screenings, Rogers formed a nonprofit
organization to continue the effort, which had
been named the Julie Rogers "Gift of

Nell Morris, "Gift of Life" Board President for more than a dozen years, said, "I have known Regina and her family long before this program was conceived, and I am truly honored to have served in a leadership position for such a long period of time. Having personally endured the loss of numerous family members and a multitude of friends to this insidious disease, I am blessed to be part of an endeavor that is helping save lives."

Life," by advertising maverick Ann Lee, as a tribute to her mother.

"She was so touched by their appreciation that she couldn't let it go," said Marty Craig, a breast cancer survivor and officer on the "Gift of Life" Board of Directors.



Over the ensuing 18 years, more than 21,000 free mammograms have been provided to medically underserved women.

The program has grown to include prostate screenings for men and a smoking prevention program for children and adults. The organization serves seven counties in Southeast Texas: Chambers, Jasper, Jefferson, Hardin, Newton, Orange and Tyler.

The "Gift of Life" Program offers educational outreach focusing on breast, prostate, testicular, ovarian and other gynecological cancers; free mammograms and prostate cancer screenings; as well as access to follow-up treatment for medically underserved people in its service area. The nonprofit organization partners with hospitals, physicians, cancer institutes and clinics in Southeast Texas to provide screenings and treatments.

"It is a huge effort now," said Craig.

"We couldn't do it without all our volunteers. I've never walked in our office that there aren't volunteers answering the phone, stuffing envelopes, whatever has to be done. More than 400 volunteers donate more than 5,000 hours of service annually, assisting with educational outreach efforts, setting up displays, registering clients — giving an hour or many hours, whatever fits the volunteer's schedule and interests.

Pat McKee is one such volunteer. "About four or five years ago, a woman walked into my gift shop with information about a fundraiser and asked if we would sell Pink Shopping Cards,"

she said. "It was a volunteer from





She has assisted with securing merchants to participate in the Pink Shopping Card project every year since. "The more I was involved and saw how they were saving lives, I just couldn't help enough," she said. As a 17-year survivor of breast cancer, McKee was happy to help other people fight or prevent the disease. "There's been so much cancer in my family. I feel very strongly that this is what God meant for me to do."

The "Gift of Life" Program also sponsors a breast cancer support group, Pink Power Network. McKee said, I was a bit hesitant about going to the meetings at first. I didn't know what to expect, but after meeting other survivors, volunteers and the staff and seeing that everyone is treated with respect, I am grateful I decided to participate.

awareness for cancer prevention, diagnosis and treatment. Activities range from "Champagne and Ribs," to the 5K Ribbon Run/Walk, to BraMANia, in which men strut their stuff, show their support by wearing decorated bras that were designed by breast cancer survivors and valued community partners for the BRA-vo! Applause for the Cause art project.

The Julie Rogers "Gift of Life" Program takes a holistic approach to preventing and fighting cancer, integrating awareness, education, screening, and treatment. It has grown to be one of the largest and most respected cancer prevention initiatives in the state of Texas. In recognition of its accomplishments, the "Gift of Life" was presented with the 2011 John P. McGovern Champion of Health Award by the Texas Medical Association Foundation and named the number one public health organization addressing critical needs in the state.

Regina Rogers' gift in honor of her mother has turned out to be a gift to so many mothers and daughters, and fathers and sons. "My mother would be deeply humbled and very grateful for the gift that saves lives in her name," Rogers said. "It is she who inspired me with her concern for women who could not afford screenings after she learned from a mammogram that she had breast cancer and underwent a double

mastectomy, which

extended her life. 'There but by the grace of God go I,' was her oft-quoted statement that reflected her desire to help others less fortunate and of limited financial means."

Rogers' philanthropic efforts reach far and wide, encompassing more than just cancer prevention and treatment. Besides serving on many boards, she has founded or co-founded organizations to provide mentoring and guidance of young people — including those in the juvenile justice system (IEA-Inspire, Encourage, Achieve); to provide scholarships to academically talented students who cannot afford to attend college (I Have A Dream Program); and a relief fund to assist those affected by hurricanes along the Texas Gulf Coast (Southeast Texas Emergency Relief Fund).

EASY JAMBALAYA

Ingredients

2 tsp. olive oil

4 Boneless skinless chicken breast cut into small cubes

1 Lb. Zummo's Party Links Sausage cut into coin sizes

Directions

Layer with the last of soaked ladyfingers and the last of the cheese mixture. Dust top with cocoa, cover and chill overnight. To serve, remove sides from pan and cut into wedges.





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

TEXAS WINE AND THE HOLIDAYS... NO RED SOLO CUP ALLOWED

he Texas fall brings cooler weather and football games with people enjoying their favorite beverages served in red Solo cups. Thanks to country singer Toby Keith we know the importance of the bond people have with their red Solo cups!

Fall in Texas for grape growers signals the end of harvest and 2012 will go into the record books as the largest and best quality grape harvest in the history of grape growing. Our thoughts now turn to those wonderful Texas wines and selecting the best pairing for the wines and food we will serve for the upcoming holidays.

Wine and food are meant to be enjoyed together since they enhance each other. Wine and food pairings are not rocket science. The key is to pair wine and food to complement not to overpower and to ensure the host feels comfortable about the pairings they have selected.

First, let's talk turkey, the traditional Thanksgiving dinner. In Texas we could roast, bake, fry, blacken, smoke, grill, or Cajun our turkey. We can get very creative with our turkeys.



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The basic rule to remember: understand the components of the wine (alcohol, sweetness, acidity, and tannin) to complement or contrast the taste of the food (sweet, sour, bitter, and salty).

If you are preparing a traditional turkey, roasted, baked or broiled, with giblet gravy and




cornbread stuffing, select a nice Sauvignon Blanc, Pinot Grigio, or a sparkling wine. Dry white wines are a great selection for the traditional turkey dinner. When adding a spicy component to the turkey, such as jalapeno cornbread dressing or blackened turkey, selecting a semi-dry white wine like a Chenin Blanc, Blanc du Bois, Riesling, or Gewurztraminer is a better choice. And if you decide a mushroom sauce would work really well with smoked turkey and a wild rice with mushrooms and bacon side dish, then dry red wines would be the best selection. You can never go wrong with a nice Pinot Noir or Syrah.

What about dessert? Wine that pairs well with the meal may not be the best for your dessert. The same rules apply for desserts, cheeses and fruits, typical after dinner selections.

- For milk chocolate foods choose lighter, sweeter wines like a Riesling, Muscat Canelli or Chenin Blanc.
- For dark chocolate foods choose a Port, Cabernet Sauvignon, Merlot or Malbec.
- With pumpkin and pecan pie Cream Sherry, Tawny Port or Late Harvest Riesling.
- With apple pie Late Harvest Riesling or Muscat.
- With cheeses like brie (young), mozzarella or swiss dry white wine.
- With cheeses like aged provolone, ripe brie, smoked Gouda, Romano or gorgonzola dry red wine.
- With cheeses like blue, Roquefort or stilton dessert wines.

All the advice in the world and the perfect pairings still come down to what do you and your guests enjoy drinking. So while you may have all the rules to follow, everyone has their wine they love and they will usually bring a bottle along as a gift (suggestion to please serve this wine). Honestly, food and wine complement each other and enjoying both with family and friends can be the best time ever.

Out of the 250 plus wineries in Texas, visit your local winery and ask the wine maker what they suggest. Yes, all the varietals mentioned are produced in Texas along with so many more that can enhance any great meal — Viognier, Roussanne, Tempranillo... So much great wine...so little time! Enjoy the holidays!





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Bragg Light of Ghost Road

rowing up in Southeast Texas during the late '50s and early '60s was a time of enlightenment, discovery and great adventures for any teenager living in this rural area. It was a time of simple pleasures, hard work yet less stress; a slower pace with fewer demands; it was an age of innocence coming to an end; It was the age of listening to your elders as they spoke of the "good old days," spinning yarns and mixing history with tall tales...like the "Bragg Light of Ghost Road."



In 1904, the Santa Fe railroad used a stretch of land between Saratoga



and Bragg, Texas, as part of a branch running through Hardin County. Stories about mysterious lights appearing from thin air and then disappearing began to spread among the railroad workers and the local communities. The Santa Fe railroad continued to use the branch until 1933 even though the eight mile stretch was considered haunted. They then removed the railroad tracks and left a straight dirt road behind.

The locals began to use the road as a short cut between the two communities. As

more people traveled the road, more sightings of the ghostly lights were

reported and the stories and rumors increased. The most popular story about the Bragg light is that of a railroad worker who was accidently killed when he was decapitated. Legend has it that the man roamed up and down the



old railroad bed at night holding a lantern and looking for his lost head; and it is for this very reason that the locals named the road Ghost Road.

Ghost Road became a popular place for daring young teenagers during the '50s and '60s looking for a thrill while trying to show off their bravery. In those days, there was barely room for two cars to pass each other and there was no place to turn around; once you entered Ghost Road, you had no choice but to travel the full eight miles until you came to the end on the other side. When and if the orbs did appear, all acts of bravery disappeared. These thrill seekers helped to spread the urban legend and soon brought national attention to the Bragg Light of Ghost Road.

Hundreds of people in Southeast Texas have seen the lights or orbs. Some of them have even been successful in photographing the orbs. Many scientists have studied pass lights yet no one can explain their origin. They all agree that they do exist and now call the Bragg Light a phenomena.

The community of Bragg no longer exists but Saratoga does. Travel east on State Hwy. 105 past Sour Lake till you reach FM 770 and turn right to Saratoga. Be on the lookout for FM 787 road marking the entrance to Ghost Road. The phenomena is open to the public and information boards along the road that discuss the road's history, ecology and folklore stories. It is still a dusty dirt road so take plenty of water and drive slow. Watch out for all the little critters that call Ghost Road their home and be sure to have your camera ready. (Hint) First travel the road in broad daylight so that you will be familiar with it.

Then if you are brave enough come back at dusk so you can find the entrance and travel the road at night. Who knows-you... too may be visited by the ghostly lights of Ghost Road.





big fish catch, jazz, and Mardi Gras shouts can get visitors to make some noise in Port Arthur. But another tonic Port Arthur offers is quiet time on the water.

A smile lights up the face of Port Arthur Mayor Deloris "Bobbie" Prince at the thought of a drive along Pleasure Island. It's one of her favorite stops and she hopes visitors cross the bridge for a bit of her waterside heaven.

Prince believes that visitors will get a genuine welcome as they experience the city. "I would like for them to look at the hearts of the people of Port Arthur. We're very diverse. People need to know about that kind of stuff," said Prince. "The people of Port Arthur are good people."

Floyd Johnson, Port Arthrur's new city manager, calls his new home "an absolute diamond in the rough, from a number of perspectives."

"This town has 'destination' written all over it," Johnson said. "We do have things natural and manmade that folks can enjoy with their families."

Texas Artists Museum and Museum of the Gulf Coast are among those that have caught his eye, as well as the city's ample waterways such as Lake Sabine. "There's tremendous fishing and crabbing," he said. For those who catch their seafood at restaurants, Port Arthur's eateries offer the cuisines of many cultures.

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
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
